Frankfort **Township** supports CASA of Will County.

The group helps the most vulnerable members our community: abused and neglected children. Last year, CASA worked with four youngsters from Frankfort Township.

CASA stands for court -appointed special advocates, meaning volunteers who closely follow the children's cases in the Will County court system. They work with parents, foster families and school officials to make sure that these kids live in a home that is safe and secure. They actually are fact gatherers who track information about the children's lives and give it to the judges presiding over the cases.

The Frankfort Township Board recently gave \$2,500 to CASA to help the recruit and train 15 new volunteers.

But Frankfort Township supports CASA in other ways that are just as important. Township residents such as Winnie Nya retired hus, grade school teacher, volunteers for the group.

Last year, CASA worked with more than 250 children — but that's just half of the kids who need help. CASA needs more volunteers; perhaps you could become one of them?

Frankfort Township Animal Control Officer Karen Zobjeck offers these tips for pet owners:

## Don't Give Too Many <u>Treats</u>

Although it's tempting to share your turkey dinner with your pets, don't overdo it, Zobjeck says. Mashed potatoes and gravy, for example, can be loaded with salt, and that's not good for dogs and cats. And some spices can be harmful to our four-legged friends.

# If You're Cold, Your Pet Might Be Too

Keep an eye on the weather, Zobjeck says. If you let your dog or cat outside, think about the conditions. Snow, ice and rain can be just as harmful to animals as it is to us.

# Batten Down The Hatches

At this time of year, some wild animals are looking for a place to hole up during the winter months. And they might be eyeing your shed, garage or attic as the perfect critter condo, Zobjeck says. Make sure everything is secured so you don't have an unpleasant surprise in the spring.

#### **Coyotes Are Lurking**

You might not see them, but coyotes have been spotted in Frankfort Township. Don't let them get your pets — supervise your dog or cat while they are outside.

#### DIAL-A-RIDE CAN TAKE YOU THERE

Once upon a time, the township's transportation service was a big secret.

Not any more.

Many more residents



have learned about the economical way to travel throughout the township.

These days, the drivers are making an average of 250 trips a week, said George Tolsky, transportation manager. They typically log 70 rides on Thursdays alone, he said.

Some people might think Dial-A-Ride's vans

are reserved for seniors. That's simply <u>not</u> true. All kinds of different people reserve rides in the township's comfortable vans, which are also wheelchair accessible. Some people use Dial-A-Ride to get to work, and others use it to get to school.

In fact, parents of children with special needs have recently discovered the great services offered by the township's fleet. Just one family used the service last year. Now five families do, Tolsky said.

But why are there more riders?

"It's our service and great on-time performance," Tolsky said.

#### **BOY SCOUT FOOD DRIVE FILLS PANTRY**

Frankfort Township's Boy Scouts have done it again.

They've filled the food pantry with tons of non-perishable food.

Last November, the Scouts collected about 20,000 pounds of food for the Frankfort Township Food Pantry and Together We Cope, a sister food pantry in Tinley Park.

But this year, they did even more. The Scouts gathered 25,000 pounds of food to be split between the two organizations.

They collected so much food that it took nearly a week to unload it, check it and store it on the shelves in Frankfort Township.

The Scouts began hauling the boxes into

the township's pantry on Nov. 10, said Jodi Gallagher-Dilling, a member of the township's staff. Dozens of volunteers worked tirelessly throughout the week to make sure that everything was put in its proper place. Some of those volunteers — like Pauline Deuran, Patsy Lane and Lynn Ganz — were there day after day.

To make sure only the

freshest food is offered by the pantry, the volunteers sorted each and every item by the date stamped on the container.

When it all was over, the volunteers had the satisfaction of knowing that fewer people would go hungry in Frankfort Township.
